Subject: Revisit SELECTED_CHAR_KIND

1 Introduction

In San Diego in August of 1998, we agreed (narrowly) that the character kind for the ISO 10646 character set should be determinable by an intrinsic function. The alternative was to use module entities (probably constants). This decision was taken before the ISO_FORTRAN_ENV intrinsic module, and the five constants in it, were accepted.

2 Proposal

Remove the SELECTED_CHAR_KIND intrinsic function. Add two named constants to the ISO_FORTRAN_ENV intrinsic module. The explanation of the functionality is substantially simpler than the explanation of the SELECTED_CHAR_KIND intrinsic function.

3 Edits

13.17.3 Character kinds

The processor shall provide two constants giving processor dependent values of the kind type

13.17.3.1 ASCII kind type parameter value

The value of the default integer scalar constant ASCII_KIND shall be the kind type parameter for character type that indicates the ASCII character set.

parameters for characters of the ASCII and 32-bit ISO 10646 character sets.

13.17.3.1 IOS 10646 kind type parameter value

The value of the default integer scalar constant ISO_10646_KIND shall be the kind type parameter for character type that indicates the 32-bit ISO 10646 character set, if the processor supports such a kind; otherwise the value shall be -1.

Note 13.17

A constant giving the value of the default kind for character data type is not necessary, as it can be gotten from KIND('A').
